Pastoral message from the Rector

Today we celebrate Mary, Mother of the Lord. Our beautiful worship building in Ballina is dedicated in her name. We don't know a lot about Mary but the glimpses we gain from the Bible tell us that she was a very special person, especially in God's eyes. God chose her to be the means for his only begotten Son to come into the world. This alone tells us that she was indeed highly favoured by God.

I think some Anglicans struggle with Mary and are not really sure how to acknowledge her, especially in our liturgical worship. Many Anglicans would cringe at the idea of praying to Mary and to have a statue of her in the church building would be confronting for some, if not many. Yet, she is clearly the mother of Jesus and someone whom God chose above all others for this sacred role.

Today, as we celebrate her Feast Day, perhaps we may have different views about Mary and how to acknowledge her. In spite of our differences, I think it is worth reflecting on the Nicene Creed and the Apostles' Creed, both of which affirm that Jesus was born of the virgin Mary. For this reason alone, as well as perhaps several others, I think we can give thanks to God for all that Mary has been in allowing the Word to become flesh and dwell among us.

May we also be as willing, and as trusting as Mary was, in all that God asks of us.

News: Wearing of Face Masks As expected, the advice from the NSW Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant (dated Sunday 2 August) is now specifically recommending the wearing of face masks in NSW during attendance at Places of Worship. Wearing a mask in this setting is not mandatory but it is highly recommended. Given that it is highly recommended Bishop Murray has suggested that face masks should be worn by all those attending a place of worship for the purpose of worship or other group activities. This applies to ministers, worshippers, staff, volunteers, contractors or visitors, where there may be other people present; remembering that they are mainly intended to protect other people, not the wearer, from COVID-19 and that they are not a replacement for physical distancing and regular hand washing. It may not be long before we do have community transmission in our area, so the wearing of face masks will not only be a responsible action to protect the vulnerable, but it will ensure that we are ready if they should become mandatory.

<u>Sunday 30 August</u> we will be celebrating ABM (Anglican Board of Mission) Sunday and commemorating the Martyrs of New Guinea. Our preacher for both online services and church buildings services will be the Primate of the Anglican Church of Australia, the Most Reverend Geoff Smith, who is also the Archbishop of Adelaide. Archbishop Geoff is a former Rector of the Parish of Ballina and has worked extensively with ABM, and has ties with Papua New Guinea.
