Pastoral message from the Rector

There is an old story of a monastery where the monks lived in complete silence, except for once a year when they were permitted to say two words to the Abbot. At the end of his first year, one monk said to the Abbot, "Food's cold." At the end of the second year, the monk said to the Abbot, "Bed's hard." At the end of the third year, the monk said to the Abbot, "I quit." To this the Abbot replied, "I am not surprised, all you have done since you got here is complain."

Whilst this has some degree of humour to it, today's readings pick up this same theme. The Israelites complained, even though they had been incredibly blessed by God, and the workers in the Gospel parable complained because they perceived they had been treated unfairly. In both of these stories, the fact that they had been the recipients of great generosity was lost. All they could see was the negative side of the story.

I wonder if this pushes a few buttons for any of our readers today. How often do we complain about things without taking time to look at the many blessings that we have received? We can so easily focus on the negatives and this can shape our actions and our words, but it can also cover up the many blessings and positives that we have received.

One of my friends has an expression that I really like. When we are talking, and perhaps having a grumble, he often adds the comment, "First world problems." This is such a gentle reminder to both of us that, even in the midst of struggles, we can still find many blessings to be thankful for, especially if we look at the plight of people in other parts of the world.

Perhaps the chorus from a very old hymn may be a worthwhile prayer:

Count your blessings, name them one by one. Count your blessings, see what God hath done. Count your blessings, name them one by one. And it will surprise you what the Lord hath done.

PARISH PHONE MINISTRY- Response to COVID-19 Suspension of Services In mid March 2020 when church services were suspended for an indefinite period and the Parish Office was closed a Phone Ministry team was formed to keep in regular contact with our parishioners. Each person agreed to phone a number of people on a regular basis.

We express our appreciation to each team member for accepting the invitation and for the regular contact made with parishioners since March. A small number have needed to withdraw. There have also been some changes to the people being contacted and the regularity of calls as a result of feedback received from parishioners. This has been a very effective ministry for keeping in contact with parishioners.

It was implied this ministry would continue while services were suspended. It was a temporary measure in response to the lockdown. The Executive Committee of Parish Council has reviewed the need for this phone ministry to continue as the means for keeping in contact with parishioners now that church services have re-commenced, and the Parish Office has re-opened. Couch Church is continuing and the weekly Mailout is available online and is posted to those without access to email. In one form or another weekly connection is being made with members of the parish family. As a result, it has been decided to conclude the phone ministry.

We are aware that some very positive pastoral relationships have developed during this time. Members of the team are encouraged to continue this connection if they would like to do so.

Parishioners are now encouraged to phone the Parish Office or contact the clergy for any pastoral needs.

We are very grateful to the positive response to the request and for the regular 'keeping in touch' to ensure connections with parishioners have been maintained during the early months of COVID-19.

Wearing of Face Masks As expected, the advice from the NSW Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant (dated Sunday 2 August) is now specifically recommending the wearing of face masks in NSW during attendance at Places of Worship. Wearing a mask in this setting is not mandatory but it is highly recommended. Given that it is highly recommended Bishop Murray has suggested that face masks should be worn by all those attending a place of worship for the purpose of worship or other group activities. This applies to ministers, worshippers, staff, volunteers, contractors or visitors, where there may be other people present; remembering that they are mainly intended to protect other people, not the wearer, from COVID-19 and that they are not a replacement for physical distancing and regular hand washing. It may not be long before we do have community transmission in our area, so the wearing of face masks will not only be a responsible action to protect the vulnerable, but it will ensure that we are ready if they should become mandatory.


EAC Prayer Points

In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days." The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew

But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."
