THE MARTYRS OF NEW GUINEA & ABM SUNDAY 30 AUGUST 2020

Pastoral message from the Rector

Today we honour the New Guinea Martyrs. These were a group of Anglican missionaries, along with many others from different Christian denominations, who were serving in New Guinea during WW2. When the Japanese invaded New Guinea in 1942, the Anglican missionaries made the choice to stay and care for the people they were sharing the Gospel with. This choice cost them their lives and today we remember them as martyrs for their faith.

In today's reading from St Paul's letter to the Romans, we read these words: "Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."

In the accounts detailing the events that led up to the deaths of these faithful missionaries, we can read that their choice to stay was a deliberate choice of faith. The Bishop had encouraged them that if they wanted to leave, they must go before the Japanese got any closer, and to stay meant that their safety could not be guaranteed. After much discussion and prayer, all the Anglican missionaries chose to stay, and not to abandon the charges God had given them. I wonder if this choice may have been influenced by today's reading from St Paul. As it turned out, several of them met their death with a sword, so these words became even more prophetic.

I have a close personal connection with the New Guinea Martyrs as I have served in several parishes where they came from and one of them also attended my theological college. I like to honour them each year on their anniversary, especially as they inspire me to keep going when things get tough. They have taught me that we can face every fear, even the fear of death, by trusting that God ultimately is in charge of our souls. They lived and died for their faith and I pray that I may be able to do the same. I hope you can also be inspired by their story.

Wearing of Face Masks As expected, the advice from the NSW Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant (dated Sunday 2 August) is now specifically recommending the wearing of face masks in NSW during attendance at Places of Worship. Wearing a mask in this setting is not mandatory but it is highly recommended. Given that it is highly recommended Bishop Murray has suggested that face masks should be worn by all those attending a place of worship for the purpose of worship or other group activities. This applies to ministers, worshippers, staff, volunteers, contractors or visitors, where there may be other people present; remembering that they are mainly intended to protect other people, not the wearer, from COVID-19 and that they are not a replacement for physical distancing and regular hand washing. It may not be long before we do have community transmission in our area, so the wearing of face masks will not only be a responsible action to protect the vulnerable, but it will ensure that we are ready if they should become mandatory.

<u>Sunday 30 August</u> Today we are celebrating ABM (Anglican Board of Mission) Sunday and commemorating the Martyrs of New Guinea. Our preacher for both online services and church buildings services is the Primate of the Anglican Church of Australia, the Most Reverend Geoff Smith, who is also the Archbishop of Adelaide. Archbishop Geoff is a former Rector of the Parish of Ballina and has worked extensively with ABM, and has ties with Papua New Guinea.
