Pastoral message from the Rector

There used to be a television show called Undercover Boss. I did see a couple of episodes of it and it was based on the CEO, or perhaps even the owner of the business, disguising themselves and going in to their own businesses and pretending to be a new person starting out at the first rung of the ladder. In this way they were able to hear what was really happening in their business and they met some of the staff who were able to give them a very honest appraisal of how things worked. Many of them commented at the end that they would not have gained that information from their line managers and it was only by becoming one of the staff that they were able to get to the truth.

I am reminded of this in today's epistle from St Paul to the Philippians, where he describes how Jesus became humble even though he was equal in every way to God. Paul writes that Jesus "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave" and that he "humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death, even death on the cross."

I never cease to be amazed how Jesus humbled himself in such a way and took on our humanity fully. This is demonstrated especially when he refused to use his divine power on the cross and allowed all of that torture and pain to happen.

Jesus was very focused on gathering people together so that they could ultimately inherit the kingdom of heaven. He looked beyond any earthly failings and looked into the heart and encouraged people to let go of anything that separated them from God and from each other. At the end of today's gospel there is a great sense of sadness when Jesus is addressing the chief priests and the elders and he reminds them that John came to them in the way of righteousness and they did not believe him, and even after they saw many others changing their ways and following John's teachings, they did not change their minds and believe. Jesus was appealing to them to humble themselves and embrace the truth but they didn't do it.

For me this is a very sobering reminder not to get too carried away with my own sense of self importance or position of authority. To be a true Christian means to be a servant and to be humble. I need this reminder from time to time, perhaps you do too?

<u>Angel Tree- A Prison Fellowship Ministry</u> Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Parish Council has made the decision to support Angel Tree in a different way this year. Angel Tree Ministry provides people with the opportunity to buy Christmas gifts for children whose parent is in prison. In previous years, our parishioners have supported this very generously, often providing more than 70 gifts per year. To ensure we can keep our parishioners as safe as possible, but also in the hope that we can still provide generously for these children, Parish Council is asking parishioners not to shop for presents this year but rather to consider making a donation to Prison Fellowship during the month of October. This will allow that agency to buy the gifts and deliver them to the relevant families in time for Christmas. The recommended value of a gift is \$30. Donations are also most welcome to assist with postage costs.

There are several ways to give:

- 1. Place your donation in the Sunday offertory, either in the mission side of the envelope or in a separate envelope labelled Angel Tree.
- 2. Drop it in to the Parish Office.

PARISH PHONE MINISTRY- Response to COVID-19 Suspension of Services In mid March 2020 when church services were suspended for an indefinite period and the Parish Office was closed a Phone Ministry team was formed to keep in regular contact with our parishioners. Each person agreed to phone a number of people on a regular basis.

We express our appreciation to each team member for accepting the invitation and for the regular contact made with parishioners since March. A small number have needed to withdraw. There have also been some changes to the people being contacted and the regularity of calls as a result of feedback received from parishioners. This has been a very effective ministry for keeping in contact with parishioners.

It was implied this ministry would continue while services were suspended. It was a temporary measure in response to the lockdown. The Executive Committee of Parish Council has reviewed the need for this phone ministry to continue as the means for keeping in contact with parishioners now that church services have re-commenced, and the Parish Office has re-opened. Couch Church is continuing and the weekly Mailout is available online and is posted to those without access to email. In one form or another weekly connection is being made with members of the parish family. As a result, it has been decided to conclude the phone ministry.

We are aware that some very positive pastoral relationships have developed during this time. Members of the team are encouraged to continue this connection if they would like to do so.

Parishioners are now encouraged to phone the Parish Office or contact the clergy for any pastoral needs.

We are very grateful to the positive response to the request and for the regular 'keeping in touch' to ensure connections with parishioners have been maintained during the early months of COVID-19.

Wearing of Face Masks As expected, the advice from the NSW Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant (dated Sunday 2 August) is now specifically recommending the wearing of face masks in NSW during attendance at Places of Worship. Wearing a mask in this setting is not mandatory but it is highly recommended. Given that it is highly recommended Bishop Murray has suggested that face masks should be worn by all those attending a place of worship for the purpose of worship or other group activities. This applies to ministers, worshippers, staff, volunteers, contractors or visitors, where there may be other people present; remembering that they are mainly intended to protect other people, not the wearer, from COVID-19 and that they are not a replacement for physical distancing and regular hand washing. It may not be long before we do have community transmission in our area, so the wearing of face masks will not only be a responsible action to protect the vulnerable, but it will ensure that we are ready if they should become mandatory.



did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself. taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of deatheven death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

Do all things without murmuring and arguing, so that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, in which you shine like stars in the world. It is by your holding fast to the word of life that I can boast on the day of Christ that I did not run in vain or labour in vain. But even if I am being poured out as a libation over the sacrifice and the offering of your faith, I am glad and rejoice with all of you—and in the same way you also must be glad and rejoice with me.

I hope in the Lord Jesus to send Timothy to you soon, so that I may be cheered by news of you. I have no one like him who will be genuinely concerned for your welfare. All of them are seeking their own interests, not those of Jesus Christ. But Timothy's worth you know, how like a son with a father he has served with me in the work of the gospel. I hope therefore to send him as soon as I see how things go with me; and I trust in the Lord that I will also come soon.

Still, I think it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus—my brother and co-worker and fellow soldier, your messenger and minister to my need; for he has been longing for all of you, and has been

distressed because you heard that he was ill. He was indeed so ill that he nearly died. But God had mercy on him, and not only on him but on me also, so that I would not have one sorrow after another.

I am the more eager to send him, therefore, in order that you may rejoice at seeing him again, and that I may be less anxious. Welcome him then in the Lord with all joy, and honour such people, because he came close to death for the work of Christ, risking his life to make up for those services that you could not give me.
